5: OUR RISE AND FALL?

The Fall of the Roman Empire can be attributed to many factors, not the least of which were internal corruption, political division, currency manipulation and outside intervention (money and influence from other countries).

As Rome grew, in size and population, the rulers of Rome became very corrupt (sound familiar?). Rather than serving the interests of the Empire, its rulers, generals, and politicians were more concerned with protecting and enriching themselves (also sound familiar?). Greed, power and control became the order of the day.

Character Counts

In the USA today, many people who are striving to serve in government are well-meaning individuals who want to contribute to the overall well-being of our country and the American people. On the other hand, there are far too many people in elected offices who are out for themselves. The sweet smell of money, greed, power and control apparently tainting their original intent to represent their constituents honorably. Instead of serving selflessly, they change their positions, policies and politics on a moment's notice in order to enrich themselves and to continue to stay in office. We need to be more discerning when it comes to who we allow to run for office in all sectors of our government ... state, local and national.

If an individual is a convicted felon, he or she cannot join the military without a special waiver. The waiver is usually only granted when there is only one felony on record and favorable extenuating circumstances support the waiver application. Persons with multiple felonies are virtually never granted a waiver. Bottom line, it is almost impossible to serve in the military if you are a felon with multiple convictions while, on the other hand, convicted felons are not prevented from running for office and becoming elected to serve in our government, even if they are running for President of the United States where they would be acting as Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces. Think about it. A convicted felon cannot serve in the armed forces but can serve as Commander of those same Armed Forces and/or become elected to Congress. Does that make sense to you? Convicted felons should not be allowed to run for federal offices, period (a few states have enacted laws prohibiting felons from holding elected offices in their state). This could promptly be enacted by passing new federal legislation (although the convicted felons in office probably would not vote for it!).

Even in cases where someone seeking office is not a convicted felon, we need to do a far better job when it comes to vetting potential candidates. Most employers require a thorough application process and a background check before hiring a prospective employee. Our political parties should also require a comprehensive vetting process prior to allowing just anyone to place their name on a ballot and run for office. A system that opens the door to elected officials holding

office, such as George Santos, Bob Menendez, Ted Stevens, Spiro Agnew, Mark Robinson (and a host of other questionable characters) or gives the American people the choice between two elderly, inept candidates for President (one who reneged on his promise to "build a bridge to the future" and one who has been convicted of 38 felonies and indicted for a host of others) is not much of a system at all.  in February of 2024.

- More and more consumers are upside down on their credit card debt than ever before. It should be noted that massive credit card debt in our country is one of the largest contributing causes of increasing inflation rates.

- Price of a new Ford 1992 = \$13,500 2024 = \$45,000
- Price of a gallon of gasoline 1992 = \$1.18 2024 = \$3.50
- Loaf of Bread \$.73 2024 = \$2.50
- One gallon of milk \$2.72 2024 = \$3.32
- Postage stamp \$.29 2024 = \$.73

Now, I ask you, do you think that the providers of all these goods and services make more money today than their counterparts did in 1992? Did our country prosper more or prosper less over the past 32 years? Progress has a price, but most reasonable people would say that it is worth it. Yes, we need to do our very best to keep inflation under control, while remembering that it is largely a sign of the times.

Not only that, but we now live in a global economy where the impact of inflation is worldwide, not just here in the USA. That having been said, I will take my chances on solving our problems and working towards continued prosperity here, rather than any other country in the world.
